Topic: Records Retention		By Rosa Oakes
Ms. Oakes asked the committee to consider the issue of retention of files on court interpreters. The AOC has collected physical files on interpreters dating back to 1996. Since then, many interpreters have moved away, are retired or deceased. Given that established retention policies do not apply to contract employees, some guidance is required in the handling or disposing of such. Upon considerable discussion, it was decided that more information would be needed. Ms. Oakes was asked to obtain information on current retention policy as it relates to personnel files from the court HR office and state government offices in general. The topic will be reviewed at the next meeting.		
Topic: Interpreters Completing Forms		By Alison Adams-Perlac
Ms. Adams-Perlac reported that it had come to her attention that interpreters were performing duties outside of their scope of practice, specifically, filling out forms for non-		

English speakers on the Online Court Assistance Program (OCAP) located in the Law Library. She asked that interpreters cease this practice, given that it goes against the Interpreter's Code of Ethics and creates issues with accountability as well as the perception that interpreters are advocates. After a meeting with top administrators, a proposed amendment to the Interpreter's Code of Ethics, which would allow the practice, was offered by Tim Shea. The committee resolved that this matter involves two separate issues; 1) allowing interpreters to fill out forms for LEP patrons, and 2) interpreters assisting illiterate patrons. Consequently, Jennifer Andrus moved to not approve the amendment to the Code of Ethics. Michelle Draper seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously. Jennifer Andrus moved that patrons should complete forms in their first language and the court have them translated after they have been filed and if the patron is illiterate, the patron will receive accommodations under the ADA. Randall McUne seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

Other Business: Gabriela Grostic suggested that interpreters be given copies of Rule 3-306 and some instruction with an opportunity to ask questions.

3 To define terms used in rules 3-306.01 through 3-306.05.

4 ~~To state the policy of the Utah courts to secure the rights of people under Title VI of~~
5 ~~the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, et seq. in legal proceedings who are~~
6 ~~unable to understand or communicate adequately in the English language.~~

7 ~~To outline the procedure for certification, appointment, and payment of interpreters~~

9 ~~To provide certified interpreters in legal proceedings in those languages for which a~~
10 ~~certification program has been established.~~

11 Applicability:

12 This rule shall apply to terms used in rules 3-306.01 through 3-306.05. ~~legal~~
13 ~~proceedings in the courts of record and not of record. This rule shall apply to~~
14 ~~interpretation for non-English speaking people and not to interpretation for persons with~~
15 ~~a hearing impairment, which is governed by Utah and federal statutes.~~

16 Statement of the Rule:

17 ~~(1) Definitions.~~

18 ~~(1)(A)~~ “Appointing authority” means a judge, commissioner, referee or juvenile
19 probation officer, or delegate thereof.

20 ~~(42)(B)~~ “Approved interpreter” means a person who has been rated as “superior” in
21 testing and has fulfilled the requirements established in paragraph (3).

22 ~~(43)(C)~~ “Certified interpreter” means a person who has successfully passed the
23 examination of the Consortium for Language Access in the Courts and has fulfilled the
24 requirements established in paragraph (3).

25 ~~(44)(D)~~ “Committee” means the Language Access Committee established by Rule 1-
26 205.

27 ~~(45)(E)~~ “Conditionally-approved interpreter” means a person who, in the opinion of
28 the appointing authority after evaluating the totality of the circumstances, has language
29 skills, knowledge of interpreting techniques, and familiarity with interpreting sufficient to
30 interpret the legal proceeding. A conditionally approved interpreter shall read and is

170 ~~(9)(B) The complaint shall allege an act or omission for which an interpreter can be~~
171 ~~disciplined or that violates this rule. The complaint shall be in writing and signed and~~
172 ~~filed with the program coordinator. The complaint may be in the native language of the~~
173 ~~complainant, which the AOC shall translate in accordance with this rule. The complaint~~
174 ~~shall describe the circumstances of the act or omission, including the date, time,~~
175 ~~location and nature of the incident and the persons involved.~~

176 ~~(9)(C) The program coordinator may dismiss the complaint if it is plainly frivolous,~~

185 ~~(9)(E)(i) The interpreter shall answer the complaint within 30 days after the date the~~

188 ~~(9)(E)(ii) The program coordinator may review records and interview the~~
189 ~~complainant, the interpreter and witnesses. After considering all factors, the program~~

210 ~~(9)(E)(v) The interpreter may review and, upon payment of the required fee, obtain a~~
211 ~~copy of any records to be used by the committee. The interpreter may attend all of the~~

213 ~~counsel and shall be permitted to make a statement, call and interview the complainant~~

220 ~~(10)(A) In April of each year the Judicial Council shall set the fees and expenses to~~
221 ~~be paid to interpreters during the following fiscal year by the courts of record. Payment~~
222 ~~of fees and expenses shall be made in accordance with the Courts Accounting Manual.~~

223 ~~(10)(B) The local government that funds a court not of record shall set the fees and~~
224 ~~expenses to be paid to interpreters by that court.~~

225 ~~(11) Translation of court forms. Forms must be translated by a team of at least two~~
226 ~~people who are interpreters certified under this rule or translators accredited by the~~
227 ~~American Translators Association.~~

228 ~~(12) Court employees as interpreters. A court employee may not interpret legal~~
229 ~~proceedings except as follows.~~

230 ~~(12)(A) A court may hire an employee interpreter. The employee will be paid the~~

11 (2) issue informal opinions to questions regarding the Code of Professional
12 Responsibility, which is evidence of good-faith compliance with the Code; and
13 (3) discipline court interpreters as provided by rule 3-306.06.

1 **Rule 3-306.03. Interpreter certification.**

2 Intent:

3 To outline the procedure for certification of interpreters for legal proceedings.

4 Applicability:

5 This rule shall apply to legal proceedings in the courts of record and not of record.

6 This rule shall apply to interpretation for non-English speaking people and not to
7 interpretation for persons with a hearing impairment, which is governed by Utah and
8 federal statutes.

9 Statement of the Rule:

10 (1) Subject to the availability of funding, and in consultation with the committee, the
11 administrative office of the courts shall establish programs to certify and approve
12 interpreters in English and the non-English languages most frequently needed in the
13 courts. The administrative office shall publish a roster of certified, approved, and
14 registered interpreters. To be certified, approved or registered, an applicant shall:

15 (1)(A) file an application form approved by the administrative office;

16 (1)(B) pay a fee established by the Judicial Council;

17 (1)(C) pass a background check;

18 (1)(D) provide proof that the applicant is a Utah resident;

19 (1)(E) complete training as required by the administrative office;

20 (1)(F) obtain a passing score on the court interpreter's test(s) as required by the

8 To provide certified interpreters in legal proceedings in those languages for which a
9 certification program has been established.

10 Applicability:

11 This rule shall apply to legal proceedings in the courts of record and not of record.
12 This rule shall apply to interpretation for non-English speaking people and not to
13 interpretation for persons with a hearing impairment, which is governed by Utah and
14 federal statutes.

15 Statement of the Rule:

16 (1) Appointment.

17 (1)(A) Except as provided in paragraphs (1)(B), (1)(C) and (1)(D), if the appointing
18 authority determines that a party, witness, victim or person who will be bound by the
19 legal proceeding has a primary language other than English and limited English
20 proficiency, the appointing authority shall appoint a certified interpreter in all legal
21 proceedings. A person requesting an interpreter is presumed to be a person of limited
22 English proficiency.

23 (1)(B) An approved interpreter may be appointed if no certified interpreter is
24 reasonably available.

25 (1)(C) A registered interpreter may be appointed if no certified or approved
26 interpreter is reasonably available.

27 (1)(D) A conditionally-approved interpreter may be appointed if the appointing
28 authority, after evaluating the totality of the circumstances, finds that:

29 (1)(D)(i) the prospective interpreter has language skills, knowledge of interpreting
30 techniques and familiarity with interpreting sufficient to interpret the legal proceeding;
31 and

32 (1)(D)(ii) appointment of the prospective interpreter does not present a real or
33 perceived conflict of interest or appearance of bias; and

34 (1)(D)(iii) a certified, approved, or registered interpreter is not reasonably available
35 or the gravity of the legal proceeding and the potential consequence to the person are
36 so minor that delays in obtaining a certified or approved interpreter are not justified.

37 (1)(E) The appointing authority may appoint an interpreter with certified or approved
38 or equivalent credentials from another state if the appointing authority finds that the
39 approved, registered or conditionally approved interpreters who are reasonably
40 available do not have the language skills, knowledge of interpreting techniques, or
41 familiarity with interpreting sufficient to interpret the legal proceeding. The appointing
42 authority may consider the totality of the circumstances, including the complexity or
43 gravity of the legal proceeding, the potential consequences to the person of limited
44 English proficiency, and any other relevant factor.

45 (1)(F) No interpreter is needed for a direct verbal exchange between the person and
46 court staff if the court staff can fluently speak the language understood by the person
47 and the state court employee is acting within guidelines established in the Human
48 Resources Policies and Procedures. An approved, registered or conditionally approved
49 interpreter may be appointed if the court staff does not speak the language understood
50 by the person.

51 (1)(G) The appointing authority will appoint one interpreter for all participants with
52 limited English proficiency, unless the judge determines that the participants have
53 adverse interests, or that due process, confidentiality, the length of the legal proceeding
54 or other circumstances require that there be additional interpreters.

55 (2) Court employees as interpreters. A court employee may not interpret legal
56 proceedings except as follows.

57 (2)(A) A court may hire an employee interpreter. The employee will be paid the
58 wages and benefits of the employee's grade and not the fee established by this rule. If
59 the language is a language for which certification in Utah is available, the employee
60 must be a certified interpreter. If the language is a language for which certification in
61 Utah is not available, the employee must be an approved interpreter. The employee
62 must meet the continuing education requirements of an employee, but at least half of

63 the minimum requirement must be in improving interpreting skills. The employee is
64 subject to the discipline process for court personnel, but the grounds for discipline
65 include those listed in this rule.

66 (2)(B) A state court employee employed as an interpreter has the rights and
67 responsibilities provided in the Utah state court human resource policies, including the
68 Code of Personal Conduct, and the Court Interpreters' Code of Professional
69 Responsibility also applies. A justice court employee employed as an interpreter has the
70 rights and responsibilities provided in the county or municipal human resource policies,
71 including any code of conduct, and the Court Interpreters' Code of Professional
72 Responsibility also applies.

73 (2)(C) A court may use an employee as a conditionally-approved interpreter under
74 paragraph (1)(D). The employee will be paid the wage and benefits of the employee's
75 grade and not the fee established by this rule.

76 (3) Review of denial of request for interpreter. A person whose request for an
77 interpreter has been denied may apply to review the denial. The application shall be
78 decided by the presiding judge. If there is no presiding judge or if the presiding judge is
79 unavailable, the clerk of the court shall refer the application to any judge of the court or
80 any judge of a court of equal jurisdiction. The application must be filed within 20 days
81 after the denial.

82 (4) Waiver. A person may waive an interpreter if the appointing authority approves
83 the waiver after determining that the waiver has been made knowingly and voluntarily. A
84 person may retract a waiver and request an interpreter at any time. An interpreter is for
85 the benefit of the court as well as for the non-English speaking person, so the
86 appointing authority may reject a waiver.

87 (5) Translation of court forms. Forms must be translated by a team of at least two
88 people who are interpreters certified under this rule or translators accredited by the
89 American Translators Association.

90 (6) Payment.

91 (6)(A) The fees and expenses for language access shall be paid by the
92 administrative office of the courts in courts of record and by the government that funds
93 the court in courts not of record. The court may assess the fees and expenses as costs

94 to a party as otherwise provided by law. (Utah Constitution, Article I, Section 12, Utah
95 Code Sections 77-1-6(2)(b), 77-18-7, 77-32a-1, 77-32a-2, 77-32a-3, 78B-1-146(3),
96 URCP 54(d)(2), and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. 2000d, et seq.,
97 and regulations and guidance adopted under that title.)

98 (6)(B) A person who has been ordered to pay fees and expenses for language
99 access may apply to the presiding judge to review the order. If there is no presiding
100 judge, the person may apply to any judge of the court or any judge of a court of equal
101 jurisdiction. The application must be filed within 20 days after the order.

102 (7) Fees.

103 (7)(A) Every three years, the Judicial Council shall conduct a market survey and
104 shall set the fees and expenses to be paid to interpreters during the following two fiscal
105 years by the courts of record. Payment of fees and expenses shall be made in
106 accordance with the Courts Accounting Manual.

107 (7)(B) The local government that funds a court not of record shall set the fees and
108 expenses to be paid to interpreters by that court.

1 **Rule 3-306.05. Interpreter removal, discipline and formal complaints.**

2 Intent:

3 To outline the procedures for interpreter removal and discipline.

4 Applicability:

5 This rule shall apply to the Language Access Program Manager, the Language
6 Access Program Coordinator, the Language Access Committee, interpreter
7 coordinators and contract interpreters.

8 Statement of the Rule:

9 (1) Removal from legal proceeding. The appointing authority may remove an
10 interpreter from the legal proceeding for failing to appear as scheduled, for inability to
11 interpret adequately, including a self-reported inability, and for other just cause.

12 (2) Discipline.

13 (2)(A) An interpreter may be disciplined for:

14 (2)(A)(i) knowingly making a false interpretation in a legal proceeding;

15 (2)(A)(ii) knowingly disclosing confidential or privileged information obtained in a
16 legal proceeding;

17 (2)(A)(iii) knowingly failing to follow standards prescribed by law, the Code of
18 Professional Responsibility and this rule;

19 (2)(A)(iv) failing to pass a background check;

20 (2)(A)(v) failing to meet continuing education requirements;

21 (2)(A)(vi) conduct or omissions resulting in discipline by another jurisdiction; and

22 (2)(A)(vii) failing to appear as scheduled without good cause.

23 (2)(B) Discipline may include:

24 (2)(B)(i) permanent loss of certified or approved credentials;

25 (2)(B)(ii) temporary loss of certified or approved credentials with conditions for
26 reinstatement;

27 (2)(B)(iii) suspension from the roster of certified or approved interpreters with
28 conditions for reinstatement;

29 (2)(B)(iv) prohibition from serving as a conditionally approved interpreter;

30 (2)(B)(v) suspension from serving as a conditionally approved interpreter with
31 conditions for reinstatement; and

32 (2)(B)(vi) reprimand.

33 (3) As long as he or she complies with rule 3-306.04, an interpreter coordinator has
34 the discretion to decline to assign an interpreter listed on the statewide interpreter
35 roster.

36 ~~(34)~~ Formal Complaints.

37 ~~(34)~~(A) Any person may file a formal complaint about a matter for which an
38 interpreter can be disciplined. A party, witness, victim or person who will be bound by a
39 legal proceeding, may file a formal complaint about the misapplication of this rule.

40 ~~(34)~~(B) The complaint shall allege an act or omission for which an interpreter can be
41 disciplined or that violates this rule. The complaint shall be in writing and signed and
42 filed with the program coordinator. The complaint may be in the native language of the
43 complainant, which the AOC shall translate in accordance with this rule. The complaint
44 shall describe the circumstances of the act or omission, including the date, time,
45 location and nature of the incident and the persons involved.

46 ~~(34)~~(C) The program coordinator may dismiss the complaint if it is plainly frivolous,
47 insufficiently clear, or does not allege an act or omission for which an interpreter can be
48 disciplined or that does not violate this rule.

49 ~~(34)~~(D) If the complaint alleges that the court did not provide language access as
50 required by this rule, the program coordinator shall investigate and recommend
51 corrective actions that are warranted.

52 ~~(34)~~(E) If the complaint alleges an act or omission for which the interpreter can be
53 disciplined, the program coordinator shall mail the complaint to the interpreter at the
54 address on file with the administrative office of the courts and proceed as follows:

55 ~~(34)~~(E)(i) The interpreter shall answer the complaint within 30 days after the date the
56 complaint is mailed or the allegations in the complaint are deemed true and correct. The
57 answer shall admit, deny or further explain each allegation in the complaint.

58 ~~(34)~~(E)(ii) The program coordinator may review records and interview the
59 complainant, the interpreter and witnesses. After considering all factors, the program
60 coordinator may propose a resolution, which the interpreter may stipulate to. The
61 program coordinator may consider aggravating and mitigating circumstances such as
62 the severity of the violation, the repeated nature of violations, the potential of the

63 violation to harm a person's rights, the interpreter's work record, prior discipline, and the
64 effect on court operations.

65 ~~(34)(E)(iii) When the investigation of the formal complaint is complete, the program~~
66 ~~coordinator shall notify the interpreter of the proposed discipline. The interpreter may~~
67 ~~accept the discipline by consent, or may request a hearing by a panel of the Language~~
68 ~~Access Committee. If the complaint is not resolved by stipulation, the program~~
69 ~~coordinator will notify the committee, which shall hold a hearing.~~

70 (4)(F) The program coordinator shall notify the chair of the Language Access
71 Committee if the interpreter requests a hearing by a panel. The chair of the Language
72 Access Committee shall assign three members of the Committee to serve on the panel
73 for the hearing and shall assign one of the members to chair the hearing. The chair of
74 the panel shall be responsible for sending notice to the interpreter, the complainant and
75 the program coordinator.

76 (4)(G) The hearing before the panel shall be private and closed to the public. The
77 hearing shall be recorded. The hearing will be informal and will not be governed by the
78 Rules of Civil Procedure and the Rules of Evidence. The interpreter, the complainant,
79 and the program coordinator all may attend the hearing. The interpreter and the
80 program coordinator may each bring counsel to the hearing. The program coordinator
81 and the interpreter may submit exhibits and call witnesses. Panel members and staff
82 may not disclose or discuss information or materials outside of the meeting except with
83 others who participated in the meeting or with a member of the panel.

84 (4)(H) If any party fails to appear, the panel may proceed on the evidence before it. If
85 the complainant fails to appear, the panel may dismiss the Formal Complaint.

86 (4)(I) The panel shall determine whether there is a preponderance of evidence of the
87 alleged conduct or omission, and whether the alleged conduct or omission violates this
88 rule or the Code of Professional Responsibility. Within 14 days, the panel will inform the
89 program coordinator, the interpreter, and the complainant, in writing, of its decision and
90 the findings of fact supporting it. The panel may discipline the interpreter as provided
91 under paragraph (2)(B), including permanently removing the interpreter's credentials.

92 (4)(J) The interpreter may appeal the decision to the Language Access Committee
93 by sending a written request to the program coordinator with 14 days of the panel's
94 decision.

95 (4)(K) The committee chair and at least one interpreter member must attend the
96 hearing. If a committee member is the complainant or the interpreter, the committee
97 member is recused. Members of the panel are also recused. The program coordinator
98 shall mail notice of the date, time and place of the hearing to the interpreter and the
99 complainant. The interpreter and program coordinator may submit briefs and exhibits,
100 which the committee shall review. The hearing is closed to the public. Committee
101 members and staff may not disclose or discuss information or materials outside of the
102 meeting except with others who participated in the meeting or with a member of the
103 Committee. The committee may review records and interview the interpreter, the
104 complainant and witnesses. A record of the proceedings shall be maintained but is not
105 public.

111 disciplined according to the panel's decision. ~~and the discipline, if any.~~ The chair shall
112 issue a written decision and analysis on behalf of the committee within 30 days after the
113 hearing. The program coordinator shall mail a copy of the decision to the interpreter.
114 The committee's decision shall be final.

115 ~~(34)(E)(v)~~ The interpreter may review and, upon payment of the required fee,
116 obtain a copy of any records to be used by the committee. The interpreter may attend
117 all of the hearing except the committee's deliberations. The interpreter may be
118 represented by counsel and shall be permitted to make a statement, call and interview
119 the complainant and witnesses, and comment on the claims and evidence. The
120 interpreter may obtain a copy of the record of the hearing upon payment of the required
121 fee.
