60-Day QRTP Hearing

Review DHS Qualified Individual's Report, determination, and documentation:

The following questions should be answered in the QI Report:

- What type of placement does QI recommend?
- If QI recommends placement in QRTP then:
 - Why can't the child's needs be met by the family or in a foster home?
 - Why is QRTP placement the most effective and appropriate level of care in the least restrictive environment?
 - How is QRTP placement consistent with child's short- and long-term goals in his or her permanency plan?
 - What were the Child and Family Team's placement preferences?
 - Do the QI and CFT agree on the placement?
 - If not, what are the reasons the CFT's placement preferences were not recommended?
- Determine if the child's needs can be met through placement in a foster home
 - If the child's need cannot, then determine whether QRTP:
 - Provides the most effective and appropriate level of care in the least restrictive environment, AND
 - Is consistent with child's short- and long-term goals in permanency plan.
- Approve or disapprove child's placement in a QRTP (Court should not order specific QRTP facility).

Subsequent Hearings

- Review QRTP placement decision
- Review the following information DCFS or DJJS provided :
 - Ongoing assessment of the strengths and needs of the child such that the child's needs cannot be met through placement in a foster home:
 - QRTP placement provides the most effective level and appropriate level of care in the least restrictive environment;
 - QRTP placement is consistent with short- and long-term goals per permanency plan;
 - Specific treatment or service needs that will be met for the child in placement;
 - Length of time the child is expected to need the treatment or services; and
 - DCFS' or DJJS' efforts to prepare the child to return home or to be placed with a fit and willing relative, a legal guardian, or an adoptive parent or in a foster home after discharge.
